UKRI OA monograph policy Jan 2024

- **Published** on or after 1st January 2024 for UKRI-funded authors.
- **In scope:** academic monographs, book chapters, edited collections, trade books (where sole output of research)
- **Outside scope:** if funded by UKRI Training Grant, scholarly editions, exhibition catalogues, scholarly illustrated catalogues, trade books textbooks, fiction and creative writing
- **Author-accepted mss or version of record:** max. 12 month embargo
- Variety of **CC BY licences** accepted
- **Third-party materials:** expecting advice on policy exceptions
- **UKRI funding:** £3.5m (all UK HEIs)
